#### Supporting Children in Understanding the Situation in Ukraine

The current situation in Ukraine is extremely distressing for us all and although we are geographically far away from the events, many in our schools and communities will be directly affected and may have families or roots in the region. Even for those who do not have a direct link, the daily news is extremely upsetting and worrying and we are aware that children may be listening in to news broadcasts, adult conversations on the topic or viewing images or footage which could make them frightened and fearful. They may also be accessing videos on social media platforms like TikTok, which are explicit about the horrific implications of a World War with nuclear weapons.

In order to support families during these difficult times, we have put together some background reading resources to help parents and carers think about how they can support children with what they are seeing or feeling.
