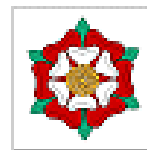

1. Christianity –

At first, the Romans tried to get rid of Christianity, but in the fourth century the Emperor Constantine ,made it the official religion of the whole Empire. Even when the Roman Empire fell, Christianity was not wiped out. Rome continued to be the centre of the Church, and even today the Pope still lives in Rome as the Head of the Roman Catholic Church.



2. Roman Buildings – For many people the most impressive legacy of the Romans is their magnificent buildings. All over the world there is evidence of the skill of the Romans as architects and builders.



3. Roman Roads – The Romans are famous for their very straight and well built roads, some of which can even still be travelled down today. After the Romans left England, it was to be over a thousand years before the Road system returned to the same standard.



4. Roman numerals – We still use Roman numerals such as these below in many forms today, such as on clocks and watches. Another very important legacy.
